FULFILLING OUR VISION

Healthy local produce for all, through sustainable farming and community engagement.



Mission

We grow food and community through farming, to advance food security, reconnect people to agriculture, and champion sustainable food systems.

Values

The Sharing Farm values ecological stewardship, positive action and collaboration. The Sharing Farm embraces empowerment and inclusiveness, and acts with respect, gratitude and integrity.

Stewards of the Land

The Sharing Farm practices sustainable agriculture, to protect our natural environment and allow future generations to farm on this land. Adding compost improves soil health, and cover crops prevent erosion and soil compaction. We use crop rotation to reduce pests and disease, as well as the need for pesticides. We also use drip irrigation and mulch to help conserve water.

The Sharing Farm honey bees are managed using sustainable practices, ensuring bees have access to good forage and retain honey in the hives to promote winter survival. Native pollinators are supported through forage plantings and hedgerows.

A Bit of History

In the late 1990s there was very little fresh produce available for clients of food banks. Mary Gazetas and several of her friends founded the Sharing Farm, in order to provide healthy food for community members facing food—insecurity. This vision continues today. The Sharing Farm annually donates on average 20,000 pounds of fresh produce to the Richmond Food Bank, community meal programs, and directly to food—insecure families. We also run numerous social enterprises to help support our charitable work. Community members are able to purchase our sustainably grown local produce through our CSA (Community Supported Agriculture) Harvest Basket program, a Farm Stand, farmers markets and an online store.

Executive Director's Report

On behalf of the Board of Directors of the Sharing Farm Society and our dedicated staff, it is my privilege to thank you—our volunteers, donors, members, sponsors and supporters—for helping the Sharing Farm grow and deliver healthy local food to people facing food insecurity in our community. I particularly want to acknowledge the tremendous support we receive from the City of Richmond; their backing makes this organization possible.

This year saw numerous transitions. I became Executive Director after Sarah Drewery resigned, and Sarah took on the new role of Richmond Garlic Fest Director. After a two year pandemic hiatus, we held the 12th Annual Richmond Garlic Fest, which was our most successful event yet.

Thanks to everyone's hard work and dedication we were able to donate 19,339 pounds of produce to the Richmond Food Bank as well as directly to families through sponsored Harvest Baskets and community meal programs. According to our colleagues at the Richmond Food Bank, food insecurity continues to increase under the dual pressures of the refugee crisis and severe inflation, not to mention the very high cost of living in the Lower Mainland. Our work continues to contribute meaningfully to the lives of many.

Thanks to all of you in our community who attended our events, purchased our produce, donated time or money, spread the word about our work, and helped us get that work done.

Richmond Garlic Fest Resumes!

The 12th Annual Richmond Garlic Fest was held on August 13, 2022. Sarah Drewery, outgoing Executive Director, moved into a new position as Richmond Garlic Fest Director. Approximately five thousand people attended, and the event raised \$49,570. We're looking forward to the 13th Annual Garlic Fest, happening on August 20, 2023!



New Equipment

Thanks to grants from the **Richmond Community** Foundation and the Community Gaming grant, we were able to improve both efficiency and ergonomics, through the purchase of a range of much-needed equipment, including a root washer (pictured here with our lovely rainbow carrots), pallet forks, and two jab transplanters.





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SHARING FARM ENTERPRISE INITIATIVES

In 2022, the Sharing Farm continued to develop our social enterprise program in order to build a reliable revenue stream to support our mission. This included the following:

Harvest Baskets – Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) program

Weekly baskets for 17 weeks. 115 Harvest Baskets shares sold. Pickup at the Farm or East Vancouver.

Farm Stand

In 2022 we expanded and extended our Farm Stand until mid-December, and many local folks came by and purchased our produce from Mary's Barn.

Online Store

Our online store continued to sell fresh produce, as well as dried flowers, honey and garlic.

Farmers Markets

The Sharing Farm attended sixteen Kwantlen Street Markets.

For the tenth year, the Sharing Farm offered a three-tier sponsorship program for individuals and companies to contribute to the Sharing Farm and provide nutritious food to food-insecure families.

Sponsorship Levels

Neighbour Basket

Sponsor partners provide four months of a weekly basket of fresh vegetables to a family facing food insecurity.

Bee Hive

In addition to a Neighbour Basket, the partner sponsors two sustainably-managed beehives and contributes to apiary maintenance. This level assists with purchasing necessary equipment, providing regular inspections for hive health, and ensuring the bees have adequate forage.

Farm Land

In addition to sponsoring a Neighbour Basket and two beehives, this level supports an acre of sustainably grown vegetables.
